The Christmas Eve I remember the most vividly happened in 1998, as a six-month Sabbatical was drawing to an end. I had spent most of it on the East Coast, and was now celebrating Christmas with my younger sister and her family in Connecticut.

On the morning of Christmas Eve, I awoke early before the rest of the family (except for my brother-in-law, who was usually up even before I was). I looked out the window, and the first snow of the season had begun to fall during the night, leaving a thick layer of snow covering their vast lawn. Having lived all my life in California – and most of it in the southern half – this was a brand new experience for me, and I was ecstatic! I quickly put my coat and boots on over my pajamas and headed outdoors!

My brother-in-law was already outside. He was very excited because he'd just invented some combination of a broom and a rake which made shoveling the snow ever-so-much easier. (I asked him recently if he's still using his invention, and he said absolutely!) I simply wandered around in the snow; it took my breath away.

Later in the day some friends of the family came by. Greg showed off his invention; my sister Judith cooked her famous Christmas Chili, as home-made potpourri wafted through the house; and the children brought out their sleds and taught me how to ride down the hill. (I'm sure I once knew how to ride a sled, but it's <u>way</u> too long ago for me to remember!)

After the guests had gone home and we'd cleaned up from dinner, we all piled into the car and drove to the Episcopal church in Middletown for their midnight mass – which began at 11 p.m. It was a lovely service; the bell choir offered music that was stunning, their priest delivered a moving sermon, and we all lifted our voices in the traditional Carols that brought us back to childhood memories.

After the last prayer was uttered and the priest "dismissed" us, we slowly and quietly walked out into the night. It was midnight; the bells of the church were announcing the arrival of Christmas; and falling from the heavens was a gentle snow. I couldn't say a word, so filled with awe was I.

Here in Southern California we probably won't experience the snow unless traveling to the mountains; but we can still be filled with awe. Whether you celebrate Hanukkah, Solstice, Christmas, Kwanzaa, or some other holy day this season, I hope for all of you many moments that leave you "breathless."

May such moments bring us back to the true meaning of the season, and renew our hopes for peace and wellbeing for all Earth's creatures.

Dear Minister in Search,

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Conejo Valley Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, and our community of members, friends, and fellow travelers, thank you for your interest in our congregation!

As the son of a Unitarian Universalist Minister and a long-time UU, I also want to thank you for responding to the call to ministry and dedicating yourself to professional leadership in our great faith tradition.

I believe this congregation represents an amazing opportunity for a new settled minister. Our congregation is filled with dynamic, energetic people who are committed to spiritual development, social justice, the environment, music and art, learning and curiosity, caring and compassion. Our congregation is infused with a spirit of love for each other and for our church, a desire to share UU values and the wonderful experience we enjoy here with others, a yearning to grow, and a devotion to service and transforming the world.

Our membership is comprised of a marvelous blending of longtime members as well as relative newcomers. On Sunday mornings, the church is a beehive of activity before, during, and after our services. During the rest of the week, the calendar is full as members come together for programs, activities, and events, and to conduct the business of the church.

My family and I joined this congregation in 2001. We've seen profound changes during the 15 years from then to now. In 2001, the congregation met on Sundays in a rented space and folded up our tent every week after service ended. We witnessed the congregation pull together to obtain and move into its own home, which happened in 2008 – a triumph of love, courage, and hard work.

Our Board of Trustees has clarified its role as encompassing six areas: mission, policy, strategic planning, financial/fiduciary oversight, assessment, and faith development; this means that a tenet of service, along with the "church business," is the spiritual development and maturation of each Trustee. We've adopted the practice of study readings and discussion as a standard part of board meetings.

Last year brought a painful moment when our relatively new and much-loved Minister, Rev Lora Brandis, announced she would be leaving due to family needs. At the same time we learned that Justine Fisher, our Director of Religious Education of 14 years, would also be leaving. I am gratified to be able to tell you that that the congregation has handled these big transitions well, with faith and a spirit of unity.

Our current Interim Minister, Rev Anne Hines, is helping us thrive forward as our Ministerial Search Committee does its job. We've been fortunate to welcome a new Director of Religious Education, Samantha Dickerson, who the congregation has known and loved for more than 10 years as a child care worker.

We are a joyful work-in-progress, a challenge that calls for boldness, the capacity to listen and lead, and a sturdy reservoir of inner serenity. I believe we need and desire a minister who will seek to understand and embrace our history and who at the same time will push us forward toward an ever more resilient future, help us continue deepening our maturity, appeal to new members and families, and grow our transformative influence in people's lives. It's December!



Ministerial Search Committee

'The CVUUF packet will give a more in depth view of us: our history, our community, who we are, what we do, what we believe and what we are looking for in a minister.'

Have you been watching our timeline that is displayed on the lectern in the foyer of the sanctuary? If so you will have noticed that the Congregational Record was live on December 1! This means that during the month of December, ministers in search will be able to view our record to help them decide if we are a congregation that they would be interested in serving.

On about January 2 the committee will be given the list of ministers that have expressed an interest in us. The MSC will then be able to view the records of those ministers.

The next step for the committee will then be to review this "long" list and choose those ministers that we want to know more about. With this "medium" list we will exchange packets. The CVUUF packet will give a more in depth view of us: our history, our community, who we are, what we do, what we believe and what we are looking for in a minister. Similarly, the ministers' packets will give the committee a deeper view of them.

Following the round of packet exchanges, the committee will arrive at a short list of candidates that they will arrange to meet with and observe in a neutral pulpit. It is from this prioritized list that in April the committee will choose a minister to ask to be the candidate for CVUUF.

After negotiating an agreement with the candidate, arrangements will be made to have the minister preach on two consecutive Sundays in May. During this "candidating week" the congregation will have an opportunity to meet and hear the candidate in our pulpit. Following the service on the second Sunday of that week a special meeting of the membership will be called to vote on calling the minister to be the full time minister for CVUUF.

The activities of the Ministerial Search Committee described above will be confidential to the six members of the committee. For that reason, you will not be receiving communications on the progress of the committee's efforts until the announcement of the candidate and the candidating week in May. Watch the "filling the pulpit" timeline in the foyer.

Keep an eye on our progress. "Filling the Pulpit" is being tracked on the timeline that is maintained and displayed in the foyer of the Sanctuary.


The monthly meeting of Citizens Climate Lobby will be in the Board Room on Sunday, December 6 at 12:30.

Meet Jill Lewis, our new editor of the CVUUF News. Liza Diniakos is turning over the job to Jill who has extensive experience editing newsletters for business and nonprofit organizations. Thank you, Liza, for your seven years of service in this role. CVUUF appreciates your talent and dedication!

Jill joined the fellowship this past August and has jumped into service right away. Aside from newsletter editor, she is volunteering as a substitute teacher in our Religious Education middle school level classes, and she has joined a Chalice Circle. She first attended the Conejo Valley fellowship when it was located at the Goebel Center in Thousand Oaks. Her daughters were barely school age. She remembers it as a small but very lively congregation, especially appreciating our Easter flower communions and the drum circles.

When her daughters Amy and Nikki became students at Banyan Elementary School, she became involved in volunteer activities at the school and in the community, initiating and implementing chorus and drama after school programs at Banyan.

Jill was a member of the Thousand Oaks Chapter of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and became heavily involved in the Women's History Project, serving as director for a few years. She wrote and edited some of the scripts about notable women who were then presented at the elementary schools either by parent volunteers or by the students themselves. The Thousand Oaks AAUW also put together a collection of scripts and published the first edition of Profiles of Women, Past and Present, with credit to Jill as editor.

She has served as managing editor of several newsletters, including two at Blue Cross of California (now Anthem Blue) and The Oaktwig, the monthly publication for the Thousand Oaks branch of AAUW.

After her husband Michael had a massive stroke in 2011, she became an active caregiver for him. Her daughter Amy is in grad school at CLU working on her MFT and Nikki will be attaining her BS in business and economics this December from CSU Channel Islands.

Her interests include reading, attending jazz dance classes at the Goebel Center, and her two fluffy family members: Coco, a Maltipoo, and Maggie, a Shihpoo. She looks forward to getting to know CVUUF members better.



TERRORISM - The world is echoing from terrorist attacks from Paris to Baghdad, from Bamako to Beirut. UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon urged the Security Council to take steps to establish peace, through political engagement, UN peace operations, and strengthened partnerships. The Security Council just adopted a resolution calling for all Member States to focus energy on combating ISIL which poses "a global and unprecedented threat to international peace and security."

HIV - A new United Nations report titled 'Focus on location and population: on the Fast-Track to end AIDS by 2030' revealed that more countries are adopting the Fast-Track Strategy developed by UNAIDS. The strategy uses country data to determine the best approach and treatment methods for each community to prevent the contraction and spread of HIV, and it will be an important tool to achieve the '90-90-90 treatment target,' getting the world closer to eradicating HIV/AIDS.

COP21 PARIS - The 21st Session of the Conference of the Parties (COP21) international climate conference in Paris will begin on November 30th in Paris, France. This year, countries will submit their own INDCs (Intended Nationally Determined Contributions) to outline their post-2020 plan to mitigate climate change. The overall goal of this conference is to create an ambitious, hopefully legally binding international climate agreement to limit global temperature rise to less than 2 degrees Celsius.

MYANMAR - Myanmar's first openly contested election in 25 years just took place recently and Nobel Peace Prize laureate Daw Aung San Suu Kyi won the presidency. This win marks the first time since 1962 that the military has not had complete control over the government. Congratulating her on this historic victory and the formation of a democratic government, United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon still stressed that the Rohingya and other minority communities are still facing human rights violations and were barred from voting. He spoke to the people of Myanmar saying that, even after this peaceful election, there is still much work that needs to be done.

REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE

Chipping away at ROE v. WADE

In November, the Supreme Court announced that it will hear its first abortion case in nine years.

Whole Woman's Health v. Cole, is focused on two new restrictions in the Texas law: doctors who perform abortions must have the right to send patients to a full-scale hospital no further than thirty miles from the clinic, and each clinic must have the same facilities as a surgical center. The clinics and doctors argue that neither is necessary, and both will narrow access to abortion services by forcing clinics to close. The earliest the Court will begin hearing the case is February 2016. Follow this case at www.supremecourt.gov.
