And yet... as I sat today on my balcony, gazing at the lushness of the trees, the early blossoms on the camellia bushes, the blueness of the sky, and knowing that just beyond my view were some incredibly beautiful hills...well, it was pretty sweet!

I am not generally a spring or summer person. But on a day like today, one of my favorite poems by e. e. cummings keeps wandering through my mind: i thank You God for most this amazing day: for the leaping greenly spirits of trees and a blue true dream of sky; and for everything which is natural which is infinite which is yes

(i who have died am alive again today, and this is the sun's birthday; this is the birth day of life and of love and wings: and of the gay great happening illimitably earth)

how should tasting touching hearing seeing breathing any--lifted from the no of all nothing--human merely being doubt unimaginable You?

(now the ears of my ears awake and now the eyes of my eyes are opened)

April 22nd is Earth Day. I hope that no matter the temps, we can celebrate the beauty that surrounds us every day of the year – the natural, the infinite, the yes.

As we explore how our congregation can best serve people in our community, an article by blogger Adam Copeland caught my eye. I'd love to hear your feedback. (His comments are edited for space.)

Reaching Out to Young Adults Will Screw Up Your Church - by Adam Copeland (5.24.2012)

I have a theory about young adults and the church. Here it goes. Let me know what you think. While many churches say "we want young people" they don't really. If young adults actually showed up and joined their church for good, the change they'd naturally bring with them would be stark, even offputting. In fact, making a congregation welcoming for young adults necessarily means it will become less comfortable for the current members.

It's just a theory, but here's why I'm suggesting it. A few stories...

First story: the ministry I lead hosts a book group that meets in a back room at a local coffee shop. We read books related to religion in a very open-minded atmosphere. Few of our book group members attend church. Some don't believe in God. Most are highly suspicious of organized religion. Well, at a book group discussion recently conversation turned to why people don't go to church and one of the members exclaimed, "Wait a second...this, this book group — it's sort of like church! I mean, I'd never go to church, but this community reminds me a lot of one. Wow." He was floored.

As many have noted about young adults today, we tend to seek belonging first; believing comes later. To welcome young adults churches need to make places where we can belong and then believe. Belonging takes time and often happens best outside the church's walls. For churches to do this means, for many of them, major change in where, how, and for whom they program.

Second story (or stories, really). Several of my young adult pastor friends tell about a time when one of them is hanging out around town, meeting new people, just being his cool/nerdy self when someone finds out he's a pastor. And this person thinks the pastor is pretty hip so she asks, "Hey, can I come to your church." The pastor sighs and says, "Yes, but you've got to know: I'm really different at church."

These pastor friends, to survive in their parishes, have taken the edge off their preaching, their politics, their big ideas, even their theology. Though the pastors know young adults are drawn to their edgy honest selves, they also know their more established members — with the power and the checkbooks — have other ideas. A lot would need to change for the pastor to be able to respond to his friend saying, "Yes! Please, come to my church. You'd love it!" And, if that gal at the bar would truly love it, what would the church's choir members think?

To welcome young adults these days churches need to welcome the atheist, the single mom, the tattooed, the unemployed, and yes (of course!) the same-sex couple.

Those are my stories. And that's my theory: **for most congregations to truly become welcoming for young adults they will necessarily need to unsettle current members.** Discuss. 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Here's what's new this month.

We have great news in from Planned Parenthood. The anti-abortion groups who had been pushing to get yet another parental notification initiative on the ballot for the fall election have failed. It is a relief to not have to do the work to oppose it. CVUUF will be hosting the monthly meeting of the Ventura County Reproductive Rights Network (of which we are members) on **Tuesday**, **April 12**. This is their first time meeting in the East County and we are pleased to be opening up our doors to this fine group. Following the VCRRN meeting at 7:00, we will have a meeting for our own Reproductive Justice Team. I am anticipating a visit from a representative of Planned Parenthood at that meeting for a legislative update.

Saturday, April 16th at 7:00PM will be a Community Forum – Islam and Muslims in America. Dr. Amir Hussain will discuss - in its concern over religious extremism- is America in danger of falling prey to hatred and Islamophobia – the irrational fear of all things Islamic and all Muslims? He is an expert in the study of Islam, and contemporary Muslim societies in North America and will look at the important role of Islam in American society and how the belief and practice of the vast majority of Muslims differ from that of violent extremists.

April 29 and 30th – This year's annual Pacific Southwest District Assembly and Annual meeting "Draw the Circle Wider: The Prophethood of All Believers" will be held at the Unitarian Society of Santa Barbara. Friday's keynote address will be given by Rev. Rosemary Bray McNatt, President of Starr King School for the Ministry. Her speech will be titled "What's in the wind?" All Member Vote April 3—CVUUF Endorsement of the Farmworkers Bill of Rights

On April 3, after the second service, CVUUF will hold an all member meeting to vote on whether to endorse a local effort to establish a Farmworker Bill of Rights here in Ventura and Santa Barbara counties. This is a historical effort to improve working conditions for those people who help bring us the food we put on our tables. CVUUF has an opportunity to support this effort and speak out for the human dignity of, and compassion for, the farmworkers in our community.

For the last 200 years farmworker jobs have been filled by newly arrived ethnic groups and waves of migration. Land owners and farm managers sought after this ever–shifting migratory labor force that was economically desperate, afraid to organize and left to bear the harsh conditions of the fields. As working conditions improved for most of the labor force, farmworkers were left behind by legislators and farm owners who exploited their powerless position and the racism often directed at these ethnicities.

VENTURA COUNTY FARMWORKERS BILL OF RIGHTS

Adequate earned sick time by employers providing 1 hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked, until a maximum of 7 sick days (56 hours) per year.



Protect pregnant women from pesticide exposure by providing pregnancy leave with job status and seniority protected when the worker returns.

Require real rest breaks with at least 10 minutes of rest time starting when a worker reaches a break area that has water, shade and bathrooms.

Crack Down on Wage Theft

Increase local resources for investigation of wage theft such as paying below the minimum wage, not providing paid breaks, or requiring work before or after hours.

Create meaningful penalties for wage theft including holding farm labor contractors and growers jointly liable for wage theft fines and back pay to workers.

Protect workers from retaliation including establishing an anonymous tip hotline to informally report a problem workplace.

Protect Health and Safety

Health and safety education for farm workers by funding nonprofits to educate workers about the necessary health and safety precautions that should be taken, or are required by law, in agricultural work.

Provide adequate safety equipment by requiring all agricultural employers to provide all workers with gloves, face masks and boots for certain jobs.

Protect workers from pesticide exposure by holding growers responsible if they apply pesticides while workers are in the field or have workers in the field during the unsafe period after pesticide exposure



Susan Frederick-Gray has now entered the race by petition. CVUUF has supported her nomination by way of the governing Board of our congregation.


