

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Theme—Courage

It seems to take more courage than ever nowadays to face the onslaught of challenges in our world. If you are an immigrant, or identify as LGBTQ, or if you are a person of color, our increasingly bigoted times require raised levels of courage. With the rise in school shootings, it even takes courage to send our children to school. It also requires courage for anyone to come out of the shadows to report sexual harassment. As leaders, educators, first-responders, parents and professionals we are all required to step forward with courage to help make the world a kinder, safer and more compassionate place for all. Sometimes it can feel like a daunting task. It's good to remember we are not alone and that we have each other's backs.

One of the ways in which we can show our courage is through being an ally to those who need support most. As a faith movement, we are waking up to the need for radical action around racial justice and healing. For white UUs, that work involves a deeper and more developed understanding of allyship. It is possibly the most courageous work to which we are called today. So this month, you are invited to begin or lean more intentionally into that work. Soul Matters, our thematic sharing circle, offers us ways to turn that work into a spiritual practice this month:

Listen and learn:

Make time this month to go through the list of videos and essays below.

Identify Your Resistance:

Notice where you find yourself pushing back while watching and reading the videos and essays. Try to avoid defensiveness. Also be sure to offer yourself compassion.

Identify and Commit to Your Work:

Maybe it's more learning. Perhaps it involves finding the courage to confront racism from a family member or co-worker. You might even be ready to invite someone into a courageous conversation. Take your time to figure it out. If you listen deeply to the videos and articles, your work will surely and clearly emerge.

MOVIE DISCUSSION NIGHT

with REV. NICA EATON-GUINN Tuesday, March 13, 2018 7pm

Join **Rev. Nica** in the Sanctuary **March 13** to watch and discuss video of the courageous **Rev. William Barber**, founder of the successful Moral Mondays movement in North Carolina. Rev. Barber spoke at the 2016 UU General Assembly and wrote, along with Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove, "The Third Reconstruction." He is also Pastor of the Greenleaf Christian Church of Goldsboro, North Carolina.

Rev. Barber is now leading *Repairers of the Breach* with the Kairos Center and hundreds of partners across America. They are launching a mass mobilization called the **Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival.** This is an organized movement to challenge the evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, ecological devastation and the nation's distorted morality.

UUA President Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray has proclaimed our denomination's support and full participation in this new Poor People's Campaign 50 years after Dr. Martin Luther King and others called for the original Poor People's Campaign. Tens of thousands of poor and disenfranchised people, clergy and moral leaders will engage in direct action at statehouses and the U.S. Capitol this spring – a six-week protest highlighted by one of the largest waves of civil disobedience in U.S. history.

Now is the time to transform the political, economic and moral structures of our country.

Caregivers Matter...Conejo Cares Caregiver Recognition Day

Friday, March 2, 2018

On Friday, March 2, 2018 Senior Concerns will host **Caregivers Matter...Conejo Cares**, a half-day program and luncheon honoring family caregivers who are caring for aging loved ones. Caregivers Matter...Conejo Cares will take place from 9:30-1:30 p.m. at Los Robles Greens, 209 Moorpark Road in Thousand Oaks. <u>Admission is free</u>. Reservations are required and may be made by visiting <u>www.seniorconcerns.org</u> or calling 805-497-0189. No walk-ins will be allowed. Limited free in-home respite is available by request upon reservation.

Today, as our elders are living longer with more complex health conditions, family caregiving is increasing in numbers and challenges. Nationally, about 66 million people report being a caregiver for someone over age 50. Family caregivers provide 80% of the long-term care services in the United States today, valued at \$577 billion or more than the total cost of Medicare. Those caring for loved ones are often thrust into unexpected roles that can be demanding, costly and stressful.

The free event encourages family caregivers to share their story, renew their spirit, embrace their fears, and relieve their stress from the challenges of caregiving. Among highlights will be an opening segment on the Power of Breathing led by Surreina.

Gallegos Gerbman, a YogaWorks Certified teacher and assistant trainer. Dr. Roy Steinberg will present the Keynote focusing on Embracing a Caregiver's Greatest Fear. Roy Steinberg, Ph.D. is a geriatric psychologist with a private practice devoted to serving older adults and their caregivers. He received his PhD from the California School of Professional Psychology at Berkeley, and is licensed in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York and California.

The program will also feature family caregivers sharing their own stories, as well as professionally facilitated table groups, providing those in attendance the opportunity to connect with other family caregivers and develop support networks. A panel discussion, moderated by Viki Kind, a clinical bioethicist, professional speaker and hospice volunteer, will focus on "How Am I Supposed to Feel." The panel will include, Laura Zempel RN, MSW, CHPN, a social worker and Palliative Care Nurse at Los Robles Hospital & Medical Center, and UCLA Staff Chaplain/Oncology Spiritual Care Specialist Michael Eselun.

Back by popular demand will be nationally-known comedienne and family caregiver Monica Piper with her look at The Lighter Side of Caregiving. In addition, family caregivers will have the opportunity to and participate in a non-denominational positive affirmation activity.

"Family caregivers play a vital role in caring for our large and growing senior population and are instrumental in keeping elders out of institutions and in the community. Yet, caregiving often takes a tremendous physical and emotional toll, leading to health issues, such as depression, and financial concerns," says Andrea Gallagher, CSA, President of Senior Concerns. "We hope Caregivers Matter...Conejo Cares will help family caregivers recognize they are not alone and an entire community stands ready to help with the support and resources they need."

2018 Pacific Western Regional Assembly Portland Oregon April 27-29

Plan to join attendees from 185 PWR congregations as the four districts of the Pacific Western Region convene in Portland, Oregon, April 27-29, for the 2018 Regional Assembly. Three dynamic speakers will address the theme, *Stories of Hope, Courage, Resistance, and Resilience*. The Rev. Dr. William Barber, a national figure in civil rights activism, will be in the pulpit for Sunday's worship service. Saturday's keynote speaker will be Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal, the first Indian-American woman to be elected to U.S. Congress. Jayapal has spent the last twenty years working internationally and domestically as a leading advocate for women's, immigrant, civil, and human rights. The Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, UUA president, will speak at Friday evening's opening ceremony. Frederick-Gray will share her emerging vision for the future of the UUA and the wider movement.

Several workshops will be offered during Saturday's programming. If you prefer, you may opt to participate in a local social justice activity. Full details about workshops and the social justice activity will soon be posted on the Pacific Western Region website (www.uua.org/pwr).

All four districts of the Pacific Western Region will hold concurrent annual meetings on Saturday afternoon. Meeting materials and delegate information will be distributed in February/March.

Regional Assembly registration will be open by January 4. You will be able to access full details and the registration form through the Pacific Western Region website (www.uua.org/pwr).

The Portland DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel, site of the Regional Assembly, is offering discounted room rates through March 29. You can reserve your room here. If you book through another link or by phone, be sure to use the group code, UU8. Full details will be posted on the PWR website before registration opens January 4.

PWR staff is working hard to keep registration costs low. An Early Bird adult registration fee will be available through January 31 and fees for young adults, youth, and children will be discounted. Still, could your congregation consider either subsidizing or fully funding the costs for at least one person to attend Regional Assembly? What a great opportunity for someone identified as a potential leader in your congregation!

- •The importance of deep listening and respect for each other.
- •Relationships with others of all ages, and the gifts that each generation brings to our community.
- •The democratic process, through which we give voice to concerns and offer our time and energy to arrive at solutions.

In the wider community, we honor our responsibilities for upholding spiritual ideals, engaging in civil discourse with those of other religious traditions, and promoting our UU values.

In my interactions with others in this congregation, I will:

- •Speak honestly and directly to the person(s) with whom I have a concern, using thoughtful, compassionate language.
- Forgive the errors and shortcomings of myself and others as we contribute to our shared ministry and express gratitude for the many gifts we bring.

- •Listen deeply to, and actively seek resolution with those concerned before engaging the Conflict Resolution Committee, Committee on Shared Ministry, the Council or the Board of Trustees in conflict mediation.
- •Expect divergent beliefs and opinions and persist in respectful dialogue—especially in times of uncertainty—remaining open to new understandings while doing my part to sustain this Covenant.
- •Respect the minister and staff's professionalism, time and privacy.
- Assume responsibility for understanding the church structure and governance model.
- Assume responsibility for keeping informed of church business.
