June 17 - A Father's Blessing - Reverend Nica Eaton-Guinn

Some of us had wonderful fathers who have given us an enduring legacy. Others had difficult relationships with their fathers or were raised without a father. On this Father's Day, we look at the way fathers impact our lives. Whether you're a father or were influenced by your own father, what legacy can we celebrate or transform? What blessings have fathers, our own or others, shared with us?

June 24 - The Blessings of Brokenness - Maggie Yenoki, MDiv.

Our fourth Unitarian Universalist principle calls us to a free and responsible search for truth and meaning. In this service, we will explore the ways that search is satisfied by the blessings we unearth within our broken places. Maggie Yenoki received her Master of Divinity degree from Drew Theological School in Madison, NJ. She is a Candidate for UU Ministry and served for two years as Minister to the Sepulveda Unitarian Universalist Society. Maggie currently serves the Monte Vista Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Montclair, as Intern Minister. She is also a certified Hospital Chaplain and practitioner in The Art of Death Midwifery through Sacred Crossings.



Minister's Message

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Theme-Blessing

"May all that is unforgiven in you Be released.
May your fears yield
Their deepest tranquilities.
May all that is unlived in you
Blossom into a future
That is graced with love."

Thus writes the poet John O'Donohue in his blessing, "To Come Home to Yourself." O'Donohue has written one of my most treasured books of all time: "To Bless the Space Between Us." I know many of you love it too. It has been such a joy to thumb through its pages letting the beauty of his poetry and sentiments bless my life as I prepare for this month focused on our June theme of "Blessing."

For many UUs, 'Blessing' is complicated, especially if we don't believe that someone or something outside of ourselves can bless us. Indeed, who has the power to bless? What is a blessing? Why do we say, "Bless you!" and how can this word be untangled from its complex philosophical and religious connotations? Many of these questions will be explored in our Worship Service on June 10th. Meanwhile, it seems the word 'blessing' can be used both as a noun and a verb. As a noun, it can mean an unanticipated gift, sentiment or event we experience, receive or give to another; something that is perhaps an unexpected delight, a possible sign of grace. As a verb, it's something we consciously offer another – perhaps a kind word, deed or thought that aims to make someone else's life better. In any case, this month I invite us to open our minds to an expanded exploration of what the word 'blessing' might mean in our lives. Investigate how blessing shows up in your life. It could be the smile of a stranger at the grocery store; it could be the kind, loving words exchanged with a friend; it could be the person who holds our hand and sits at our bedside when we are sick; or it could be the nourishment we receive from a delicious, healthy meal; or even the joyous laughter of children. I invite you to take a mindful look around during your ordinary days and start noticing and maybe even counting the blessings in your life. If you're willing, try playing with the idea of whom you might wish to offer a blessing to.

The most important thing to know about worship this month is we are moving to ONE SERVICE at 10 am for the summer. That's ONE SERVICE – throughout June, July & August, at 10am only.

On June 3, we will bless our youth and RE program. We have 3 high school seniors who will be 'bridging' – graduating from our youth program and going out into the world. We will bless them on their journeys, while acknowledging the bountiful blessing that our Religious Education teachers are to this community and our kids. All of you who volunteer to mentor and teach our kids are an invaluable gift to our community. I can hardly say this often enough, but we simply couldn't do what we do without all of you. Thank you for your loving, dedicated service to our children and youth.

Meanwhile, on Sunday, July 15th, those members and I who attended our denomination's General and Regional Assemblies will share reflections from our larger faith, keeping us connected to the interdependent web that is our wider Unitarian Universalist Association.

From July 16 – August 13, I will be taking 3 weeks of Study Leave followed by one week of vacation. Study Leave gives me a precious opportunity for deep study, learning, reading, worship planning and visioning for the coming year. This is when, as O'Donohue said, "All that is unlived in [me may] blossom into a future, that is graced with love." During that time I will not be available by email or phone, so that I may engage in an undisturbed, deep visioning and reflection process. Never fear! Dianna and Sam will continue to be in the office on their regular schedule and Tom Wolf, our Board President is no more than a phone call away should an emergency arise. I look forward to returning to the pulpit on August 19th inspired and refreshed. Thank you for the blessing of this time to return to the well.

President's Message

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This June President's message is the last one that I will write for this two-year term as president. I thought that, instead of ruminating on the theme of the upcoming month, I would speak in more general terms regarding CVUUF's last year and the health of our community.

We started the church year quite concerned about the long term financial issues facing our congregation. There were Board meetings, Financial Task Force meetings, and many conversations both small and wide, regarding our need to find answers to our deficit spending.

After investigating a variety of other alternatives, we came up with the plan for the Capital Campaign. We, the members of CVUUF, have responded marvelously. We voted overwhelmingly to proceed in January and have been able to put together a successful operation in half the time many congregations attempt to do it. For that I want to thank Hilary Rosen, Jason Hall, the entire Capital Campaign Committee, those of you that have volunteered in one capacity or another to help, and of course the congregation as a whole for stepping up. As I write this, we have raised over \$720,000 toward our goal. If you are reading this in the first few days of June, I know that our number will be even higher. Our future has been assured, and our mission will be able to continue to effect change in the Ventura County community.

But enough about money, right? In all of our effort to insure our viability into the future, it might sometimes seem to have come at the cost of seeming too concerned with finances. So, I want to move on to discussing the leadership of CVUUF and the upcoming Annual Meeting. There are dozens of talented people who help CVUUF run, and the Council of Directors is a critical piece of that, but I want to talk below specifically of the Board of Trustees.

Every month when the Board meets, I am so proud of the way that we speak to each other and work together. It has truly been a privilege to work with such talented and concerned individuals. We work under both the CVUUF Covenant of Good Relations and a Board Covenant created for the same purpose, and we have formed a collegial and respectful bond that allows us to discuss sensitive areas in a way where everyone feels heard and everyone feels valued. There is a Process Observer at each meeting, and their comments regarding our behavior at the meetings have been overwhelmingly positive.

At the upcoming Annual Meeting, three members have been nominated for re-election. Peter Schlaus, who has been just an amazing Treasurer this past year, At Large member Tim Snowber, who always moves our Board conversations forward with insight, and myself. You will also be asked to vote for one more member, as Kathleen Holland will be stepping down. She has done a remarkable job, and I am quite sad to see her leave. Jason Hall has been nominated to take her place as Secretary for a one-year term.

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As members you will also be asked to vote on three other items – the election of three people to the Conflict Resolution Committee, a vote on the 2018-2019 Budget, and a full membership vote to move the annual giving to the spring rather than the fall. Peter and the Board have worked very hard on the new budget, and it is as tight as we think we can make it. We have resisted the impulse to spend aspirational money that we cannot actually afford yet. It's \$40,000 in the red just as predicted, and on track for our post Capital Campaign financial recovery as outlined by Peter at the Mid-Year Meeting.

It makes a lot of sense to move the annual giving time to the spring. The Stewardship Committee has asked for the change to be part of the Annual meeting to provide both time to discuss and to promote buy in for the change. One benefit of that would be that we will not be having a pledge drive this coming fall, but rather that your monthly or pro-rated annual pledges would continue as is for the following 8 months. The other main reason is that we would be then able to create each next year's budget after we knew how much money we had for the coming year.

I look forward to seeing you all at the Annual Meeting on June 10th at 11:30, and I hope we all have a great summer!

Being an Ally for Collective Liberation
Interactive Workshop with
Chris Crass

Sunday, June 3rd 2:00-4:00 p.m.

While awareness of power, privilege and oppression is growing, the question "what can I do" persists. Using stories from his own experience as a white person coming into consciousness about racism and as a man coming into awareness of sexism, Chris takes people on a journey that many can relate to, yet few speak openly about. He shares openly and honestly, with humor and humility, about the often painful experience of becoming aware of one's privilege, and the awkward confusion of trying to figure out what to do. For Chris, the work of an ally isn't just to work to end the injustices impacting others. It's about working against supremacy systems that pit us against each other, suffocate our full humanity, and undermine democracy and economic justice for all.

Join us for an interactive workshop where we will focus on developing a culture of resilience, inspiration and courage to nourish and sustain us.

Chris Crass is a social justice educator who writes and speaks widely on courage for racial justice, feminism for men, and creating healthy culture and leadership for progressive activism. He was a founder of the anti-racist movement building center, the Catalyst Project, and helped launch the national white anti-racist network SURJ (Showing Up for Racial Justice). Rooted in his Unitarian Universalist faith, he works with congregations and religious activists to build the Spiritual Left. He is also the author of Towards Collective Liberation: anti-racist organizing, feminist praxis, and movement building strategy and "Other America": Anti-Racist Resources for White People Taking Action for Black Lives Matter.



We, the members and friends of this congregation, value:

- •Opening our hearts and minds to those who have traveled journeys unlike ours and whose strengths and challenges may be different from ours.
- A welcoming space for all to speak their truth respectfully.
- •The importance of deep listening and respect for each other.
- •Relationships with others of all ages, and the gifts that each generation brings to our community.
- •The democratic process, through which we give voice to concerns and offer our time and energy to arrive at solutions.

In the wider community, we honor our responsibilities for upholding spiritual ideals, engaging in civil discourse with those of other religious traditions, and promoting our UU values.

In my interactions with others in this congregation, I will:
